AAUW Used Book Sale

The Fort Atkinson Branch AAUW has held its annual used book sale every year (except "Covid 2020") for over 40 years. The sale is managed by a dedicated board, which began when Betty S. was chair. The board continued under the expert leadership of Ute M. who turned the chairmanship over to Barb P. Each of these chairs held their position for over 5 years. Before the used book sale board was developed, the chairs or co-chairs took on many of the details of the sale making the chairmanship a big job. This does not diminish the support and hard work of individual members before the board was formed. The development of the used book sale board has spread leadership responsibility over many.

Feeling that this long-term commitment of chairing the sale may deter future volunteers from taking on the chairmanship, I signed up to head the used book sale board for 3 years. This was my final year, as I had a "gap year" with Covid. Kathy M. has volunteered to co-chair, so our board is seeking the second co-chair position. Because Kathy is our president, it would be great if someone volunteered to chair the used book sale board. Many of us plan to continue on the board so there should be plenty of support for our next sale. Please reach out to me if you are interested in signing on to this position.

Nicaragua Project

Around the turn of the century, 21st century that is, with Carolyn N. as our branch president, the Appleton branch had an article in the state newsletter requesting items to be collected and sent to Nicaragua for sewing centers there. These centers began in Nicaragua as a method for women to learn sewing and baking skills in order to make items to sell so they could support themselves and their families. Our branch members collected items to be sent to Nicaragua. Ruth Schauer followed Carolyn as president and the Nicaragua Project grew! We welcomed Lucy Harvey from Appleton to tell us what their branch was doing to help women in Nicaragua, bringing with her many American Girl doll dresses for purchase. These dresses were all made by women from the sewing centers in Nicaragua. They were meticulously sewn.

We learned that Fort Atkinson, WI is a partner city with Puerto Cabezas Nicaragua. This partnership began with Fort Atkinson community members, Hugh Highsmith, Glenn Lepley, Bob Martin and others forming a community group that traveled to Nicaragua in the 1960's, early 70's. Their history included donations and projects to support the very poor community of Puerto Cabezas.

With Ruth S. as leader, members of our branch joined others from Fort Atkinson and surrounding area to relight the fire of the Wisconsin/Nicaragua Partners. Soon we were partnered with Wisconsin/Nicaragua Partners from Stevens Point to determine how we could continue our efforts in supporting this partnership. Amy Wiza, president of WI/Nicaragua Partners in Stevens Point was a guest speaker at our branch meeting. The Fort Atkinson group met monthly at Café Carpe, enjoying a meal, a fun raffle, and a casual meeting. Our local Partners group sold fair trade coffee and held an annual garage sale at Barbara Lorman's home as fund raisers. Many of our branch members contributed items and worked the garage sale. Proceeds supported the educational needs of many Puerto Cabezas students, as well as supplies for the Learning Center for their students. Ruth even travelled to Puerto Cabezas to visit the Learning Centers. Puerto Cabezas suffered losses when Hurricane Felix hit in 2007 and Hurricanes Eta and Iota hit in November 2020. Our local group sent funds to rebuild and support as needed.

Over time, the Fort Atkinson group became smaller so that at this time, it is no longer meeting. Wisconsin/Nicaragua Partners is alive and well in Stevens Point, but the Fort Atkinson group is on the verge of dissolving, following a long hiatus.

2021 AAUW Second Chance Scholarships Recipients

The AAUW Second Chance Scholarship was awarded to women who plan to continue their education at a vocational or technical college, after having been out of the mainstream of education for more than one year. Applicants are either a graduate of Fort Atkinson High School, a resident of Fort Atkinson, or be currently employed in Fort Atkinson.

Amy McKenzie

This year, a \$4,500 Second Chance Scholarship was awarded to Amy McKenzie, an employee of Blackhawk Fitness. She is enrolled in the Administrative Professional program at Blackhawk Technical College. A \$3,000 Second Chance Scholarship was awarded to Morgan Hayes, a 2007 graduate of Fort Atkinson High School, who is completing her nursing studies at Blackhawk Technical College. Cheyenne Kopp, a 2013 Fort Atkinson graduate, will receive a \$2,000 scholarship. Cheyenne is completing an associate degree in finance at Madison Area Technical College.

AAUW promotes equity for all women and girls, lifelong education, and positive societal change. Local women returning to college to complete a degree are encouraged to review the AAUW scholarship eligibility requirements at either the Fort Atkinson Community Foundation at www.fortfoundation.org or the Jefferson Community Foundation at www.jeffersoncommunityfoundation.org. The application process for the 2022 scholarship season at both foundations will get underway later this year.



The book group met on Tuesday. October 12th at the Café Carpe to discuss this quarter's book selection, <u>Between Two Kingdoms</u>, <u>A Memoir of a Life Interrupted</u> by Suleika Jaouad.

This memoir is about a young woman's cancer journey from diagnosis through life cancer free. It is a beautifully written, often hard to read, book that doesn't hold anything back in the telling of life after receiving the news that you have, an often fatal, type of cancer at the young age of only twenty-two. The first half takes you through the brutal treatments, associated debilitating illnesses, loss of independence, and changed relationships.

The second half of the book focuses on the author's nearly as painful task of rejoining the healthy after being given the "all clear" after of treatment and trying to discover who she was and what her new role in the world would be.



The title of the book is a quote Susan Sontag wrote in <u>Illness as Metaphor</u>: "Everyone who is born holds dual citizenship in the kingdom of the well and in the kingdom of the sick.

Although we all prefer to use only the good passport, sooner or later each of us is obliged, at least for a spell, to identify ourselves as citizens of that other place".

Eleven members of the book club discussed the many topics brought up in the book and shared personal experiences around the issue of cancer...whether as a patient, or caregiver, or friend. There were tears, laughter, and a great sense of shared humanity.

Our next meeting will be January 18 at 6:00 at the library where we will be discussing *On Juneteenth*,

Thank you to everybody who emailed because they could not come. We will be getting ready for the summer season in a few months. Keep up with your Newsletter for updates on the next purse put together event.


The Gerrymandering Game

Every citizen has the right to know that their vote counts and that no politician has manipulated or gerrymandered that vote to their individual political advantage. Gerrymandering is when a political group changes a voting district to hurt another group or work to their advantage. It began in 1812 when Governor Elbridge Gerry of Massachusetts signed a bill that redistricted his state to benefit his Democratic-Republican Party.

In Wisconsin, the responsibility for drawing district lines rests with our legislature which happens every 10 years after the US Census. This is a nonpartisan issue that both Democrat and Republican politicians have used to manipulate votes.

Back in 2009, the Democrats in Wisconsin could have solved this problem by passing a bill before them that would have banned gerrymandering and given the state nonpartisan redistricting. Democrats did not want to pass this bill because they thought they would win the election in 2010 and could rig the maps for a Democratic advantage. They didn't win a majority in either the Assembly or the Senate, so the game was passed on to Republicans.



Republican redistricting work was not done at the Capital but at an outside law firm. No one other than Republican legislators were allowed to look at the maps and then they needed to sign an oath of secrecy. No viewing by the press, other members of the legislature or the public

Currently, 51 counties have passed resolutions urging the Legislature to ban gerrymandering. The Marquette Law School poll has shown that 72 percent of Wisconsinites want to ban gerrymandering.

Urge your representatives to vote for your fair representation.
