President's Corner

It has been a cold and brutal January in many ways. In early January you should have received an e-mail from our national organization regarding changes in bylaws, public policy priorities and membership dues. I am going to share the feedback to AAUW that I provided to them on public policy priorities and membership dues (I did not provide feedback on bylaws). The period to comment online ends on January 29, but the membership will have an opportunity to vote on them in April.

Membership dues. I have the financial means to pay the proposed increase in dues and it will not be a factor when deciding if I want to renew my membership. However, it seems to be at cross purposes to last year's proposal to open membership to women without a college degree who, presumably - on the average- make less money than women with a college degree. Was the organization only wanting to (effectively) open membership to those women who have no college education but can afford membership? Are we going to offer a scholarship or fee admission to women who demonstrate financial hardship? The group that will be most affected by the increase are the same group that were targeted for membership by eliminating the education requirement for the stated goal of increasing socioeconomic diversity within the organization. *

Public Policy Priorities: I am confident in believing that everyone in our organization (at least in our branch) is "for" social justice. I personally wish that our educational focus (branch, state, and national) would be more


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directly intended to promote women in leadership positions in fields where women are underrepresented (STEM field, department chairs and deans in academic institutions, CEOs in businesses, business owners, state and national political offices, heads of research labs and think tanks). We talk about goals pertaining to women in higher education, but our actions are more directed to social, cultural, and financial barriers to setting the stage to reduce barriers for more girls/women to access to higher education. Maybe there are ways to support both.

Since I have recently watched the movie "Conclave" which explores doubts by people in leadership roles, I am going to share some of mine, I don't know how much our scholarships to undergraduate candidates (high school students) from our book sale money do to help young women to achieve a college degree. I do think they have value to say "you go, girl" and "there are women you don't even know who see you and support you" but it is probably not enough money to make a difference in going or not going to college. There are a LOT of scholarships to high school graduates managed by the Fort Foundation. So in that regard, our graduating high school students are already enriched by a generous community invested in the future of its young people. My thoughts about supporting girls are going to two ends of the spectrum: middle school students who are just starting to think about what they want to be when they grow up (programs like Tech Savvy); and support for women who are midway or at the end of their path to earn doctorate or professional degrees. This is the time when their saved or other initial funding may have out. For this group, attainment of their goal is a long hard and often lonely road. Financial support at that point might spare an extended daily menu of peanut and jelly sandwiches, living in housing that is cheap but not safe, and getting to classes, residencies or practices using unsafe or unreliable transportation. Or buys them some sleep instead of working 3 jobs.

I encourage you to share your ideas (including your doubts) with me and with other members. I welcome hearing your disagreement on ideas I shared and also have confidence that you can offer different and better ones.

*Reminder: In 2024 the membership of AAUW voted against the referendum to allow non-degreed persons to join the organization.

AAUW-WI Convention 2025 Highlights

The 104th Wisconsin State Convention will be held at the Stoney Creek Hotel La Crosse – Onalaska, April 25-26. Reduced guest room rates have been negotiated at \$104 plus tax (\$118.04 total) per night.

· Optional Tour

On Friday morning, an optional guided tour of Mary of the Angels Chapel at St. Rose Convent in La Crosse, founded by the Franciscan Sisters of Perpetual Adoration in 1878, will be offered to those who arrive early. The church is Romanesque style, with Corinthian pillars and Bavarian stained glass windows. Altars are constructed of Italian marble inlaid with Venetian glass and mother of pearl mosaics. There is no charge for the tour.

Keynote Speakers

- Keynote speaker Amanda Goodenough, an educator and consultant, works to elevate historically marginalized voices and advance racial justice. She is currently Lead Executive Officer and Founder of Goodenough Consulting, LLC.
- Prior to assuming that position, she worked for 17 years as the Director of the Research and Resource Center for Campus Climate at the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse. Amanda serves on the boards of numerous organizations focused on justice, equity, decolonization, and interconnectedness. Her honors include the Social Justice Achievement Award for the YWCA Tribute to Outstanding Women (2010) and the La Crosse Area Martin Luther King Jr. Leadership Award (2021). The title of Amanda's convention presentation is "Welcome to the Struggle . . ."
- Lynda Drews of Green Bay is the author of *The Maid and the Socialite: The Brave Women Behind Green Bay's Scandalous Minahan Trials.* Her keynote, "Uncovering the Lost Histories of Women," will discuss the true story behind the book. The historical nonfiction, written in the victims' voices, discusses the truth about the women's abuser, a famous Green Bay surgeon. *Midwest Book Review* says, Lynda's book is "written with the drama of fiction and the compelling research of fact." She also wrote *Run at Destruction: A True Fatal Love Triangle* and *Circle of Innocence*. Lynda will have books available for signing.

· Concurrent Sessions

Concurrent sessions will feature topics such as the differently abled, artificial intelligence, big money and politics, the Holocaust, reproductive health, and local African American history.

· Convention Activities

Traditional convention activities, such as tri-board displays from each branch and a fundraising silent auction, will be included. Branches are encouraged to donate baskets for the auction. The Friday evening "Sweet Suite" will again be offered.






Adelante! Book Club
