Joan Marie Fitzgerald is a member of the <u>Wisconsin State</u> <u>Assembly</u>, representing <u>Wisconsin's 46th Assembly</u> <u>district</u> since <u>2025</u>. She previously served five years as a member of the Jefferson County Board of Supervisors.

Joan was raised and educated in <u>Greendale, Wisconsin</u>, graduating from <u>Greendale High School</u> in 1982. She attended the <u>University of Wisconsin–Whitewater</u>, earning her bachelor's degree in secondary education, and then her master's in educational curriculum and instruction. She worked for 33 years as a high school math teacher for the School District of Jefferson before retiring in 2020.

Joan Fitzgerald obtained her first public office in 2019, when she was appointed to the Jefferson County Board of Supervisors.

In February 2024, Fitzgerald announced that she would run for <u>Wisconsin State Assembly</u>. Her district, the 46th, is comprised of most of the western half of Jefferson County along with part of eastern Dane County. Fitzgerald won the election by 1,766 votes.

Representative Fitzgerald has authored two assembly bills related to firearms and two resolutions related to violence awareness. Her current committees are: Committee on Ways and Means, Committee on Workforce Development, Labor, and Integrated Employment.

2025 AAUW Book Sales

The 2025 Book Sale was held September 5th and 6th at the Fort Atkinson Municipal gymnasium. There was a moderate crowd and a steady flow of sales both days. We were able to donate a fair number of books to various groups after the sales was concluded which reduced the number of books that had to be recycled post sale.

Final revenue number directly from the sale were \$6,007.17. This was down approximately 30% from 2024. Luckily, our crack online sales team of Barb Rohland and Pam Dennis sold an addition \$1,939.34 in eBay sales since January. This gave us total sales of \$7,946.51 — less expenses of \$606 — for a grand total of \$7,340.51.

Announcement:

At the July and August Board Meetings, the Book Sale Committee presented a proposal to the "Board" to discontinue the book sale operations as of the 2025 sale. Much thought, consideration, and discussion amongst the committee went into making such a hard and painful proposition. It was not made lightly.

Some of the issues leading to the decision:

- *Changes to the book buying and reading habits of reader
 - increased use of libraries, more use of e-books, more use of audio books
- *Decline in quantity and quality of book donations over last several years
 - down approximately 30-35% year-over-year
- *Decline in Summer warehouse volunteer hours over last five years
 - some current volunteers retiring
- *Struggle to keep volunteer vendors
 - *Decline in book sellers attending and purchasing in last few years

AAUW Fort Atkinson has had a very successful history with the book sale, 47 years in fact, but the reward to effort ratio shows that now is the right time to find new money raising activities to focus on, activities that are less time and labor intensive.

You will be asked to vote on this at the October meeting.





Book Recommendation

Invisible Women: Data Bias in a World Designed for Men by Caroline Criado Perez

On the advice of a fellow member of our branch, Merrilee Lee, I read "Invisible Women: Exposing Data" Bias in a World Designed for Men" by Caroline Cried Perez. I'm extremely glad I did. Obviously, I was aware of much of the bias (it was a part of my marketing studies in my MBA program) and for the simple fact that I've been a woman in a man's world for a *lot* of years. But I would be lying if I said I didn't have my eyes opened, my mind blown and my heart hurt through the reading of the book. I was frustrated, angry, cursing, and yelling into the void at various points throughout the reading. I thought we had come further than we had. All the glass ceilings I had crashed through were my personal exceptions, not the rule...so demoralizing. I think everyone in our branch would get a lot out of reading this book and I encourage you to do so.



Here's a bit about the book according to an Amazon review:

Data is fundamental to the modern world. From economic development to health care to education and public policy, we rely on numbers to allocate resources and make crucial decisions. But because so much data fails to take into account gender, because it treats men as the default and women as atypical, bias and discrimination are baked into our systems.

And women pay tremendous costs for this insidious bias: in time, in money, and often with their lives.

Celebrated feminist advocate Caroline Criado Perez investigates this shocking root cause of gender inequality in *Invisible Women*. Examining the home, the workplace, the public square, the doctor's office, and more, Criado Perez unearths a dangerous pattern in data and its consequences on women's lives.
