# Greetings from the Capital – Joan Fitzgerald

**Greetings from the Capital!** After the holidays, we returned in January to a full agenda of committee meetings and session days. There are two big issues that both sides of the aisle are working on - data center regulation and the Knowles Nelson Stewardship fund.



During the January Assembly Session, AB 315 relating to extending funding for the Knowles Nelson program passed on a strictly partisan basis. The proposal as written by Republicans does not contain adequate funding for land acquisition which is a main goal of the program. While I applaud these efforts to extend some funding, I am hoping that we can have discussions and find a compromise that maintains the integrity of the Knowles Nelson Program, while also addressing some of the concerns. My office has heard from dozens of people in support of this program, and I hope we can find agreement on a bill that the Assembly, the Senate, and the governor can all agree on.

The other big topic that my constituents care deeply about is the regulation of data centers. In January, the Republican authored bill was brought to the Assembly for a vote and passed on a mostly partisan basis. We are still working on the details regarding: energy production and placement of facilities, energy costs and protecting rate payers, water usage and conservation, and overall resource planning. Like our efforts around the Knowles Nelson program, there is plenty of room to cooperate and compromise on these issues.

I've been working hard, with my colleagues, to introduce legislative packages to address concerns around Agriculture, Education, Child Care, and Election Integrity. Just this week, the 23 First Term Assembly Democrats introduced a constitutional amendment bill that would protect the privacy rights of all Wisconsinites. There are lots of things going on in Madison, and since we'll be ending session in February, we are hoping to get some good legislation passed before then.

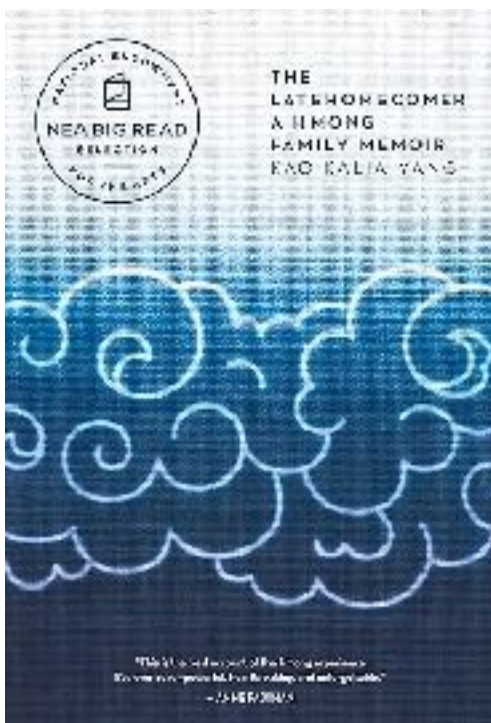
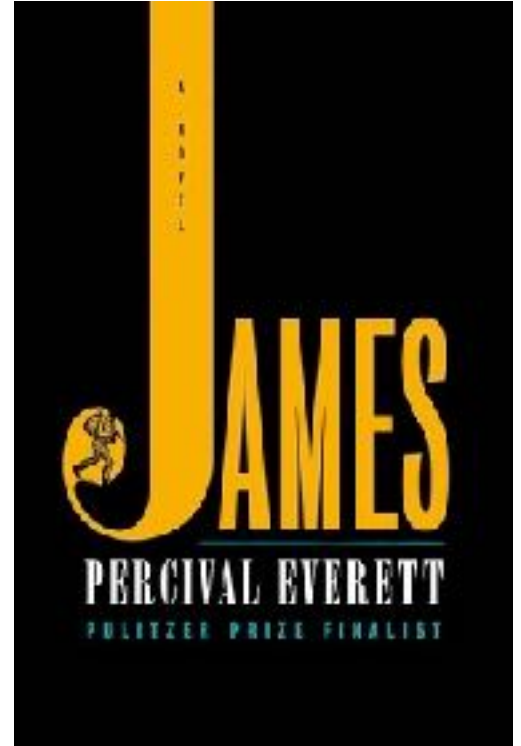

The novel is a reimagining of the Adventures of Huckleberry Finn by Mark Twain, but told from the perspective of Jim, or James in this case. The topics of racism and ownership and human relationships were energetic and extremely interesting during the meeting. The book was definitely worthy of its Pulitzer Prize, National Book Award for Fiction, and Kirkus Prize, as well as our groups two thumbs up!



The Adelante Book Club will meet again April 21 at the Fort Library from 6:00-8:00. We will be reading the “Latecomer: A Hmong Family Memoir” by Kai Kalia Yang.

Yang’s memoir of a family’s harrowing escape from war in Laos is a love letter to her grandmother, a troubling portrait of the consequences of US intervention in Southeast Asia, and a glimpse into the little-seen exodus of the Hmong people, first to refugee camps in Thailand and then, for many, to new homes in Minnesota.

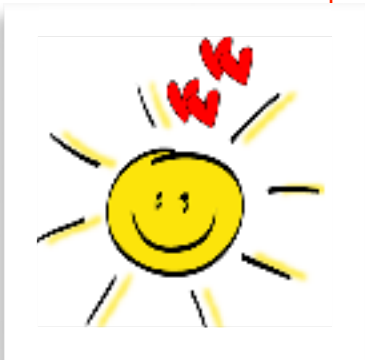
## Key February Events in Women's History



- Feb 1, 1978: The U.S. Postal Service issued the first stamp honoring a Black woman, abolitionist Harriet Tubman.
- Feb 4, 1987: The first National Women in Sports Day was proclaimed.
- Feb 11, 1989: Rev. Barbara Harris was ordained as the first woman bishop in the Anglican Communion.
- Feb 12, 1869: The Utah Territorial Legislature passed a law allowing women to vote, a major step for suffrage.
- Feb 15, 1921: The Suffrage Monument, honoring Susan B. Anthony, Elizabeth Cady Stanton, and Lucretia Mott, was dedicated at the U.S. Capitol.
- Feb 17, 1870: Esther Hobart Morris became the first female Justice of the Peace in the U.S. (Wyoming).
- Feb 23/28, 1909/1917: The earliest "Women's Day" was observed in the U.S. on Feb 28, 1909, while Russian women began a crucial strike on Feb 23, 1917 (Julian Calendar), leading to the international adoption of the date.
- Feb 24, 1912: Henrietta Szold founded Hadassah, the largest Jewish women's organization in the U.S..
- Feb 24, 1967: Jocelyn Bell Burnell discovered the first pulsar.
